## WHAT'S IN BLOOM

- plants for you to consider for your garden

*Erica carnea* 'Kramer's Red' – a dark pink winter blooming heather

*Erica carnea* 'Springwood White' – white winter blooming heather

*Mahonia* 'Charity' – this has been blooming since the end of November

*Viburnum* 'Pink Dawn' – blooms for weeks in the winter

*Helleborus x hybridus*

*Jasminum nudiflorum* – Winter Jasmine

*Galanthus* sp. – a large, early blooming cultivar is up and open

*Hamamelis* sp. – Witch Hazel

- and the *Primulas* from Safeway have survived and are blooming

## THINGS TO DO IN THE GARDEN

It's time to give your Hellebores a trim. Oriental and Lenten Roses both benefit from the removal of all old foliage. As well as hiding new flowers, old foliage can be infected with a fungus that causes blackspot. This fungus can spread to and ruin the new flowers, and weaken the overall plant. Add a top dressing of compost or manure to keep them strong.

## PLANT SALE – the how's and why's

Please note these dates on your calendar:

**Friday, May 7, 2010** – plant sale set up, afternoon and evening

**Saturday, May 8** – plant sale, morning

Every May our club has a Plant Sale to raise money. It is our largest source of revenue. The monies earned keep our dues low and help pay our rent. Our earnings make it possible for us to give scholarships, make donations within our community and have good speakers at our meetings.

You are asked to pot up plants from your garden and donate them to the sale – it takes a lot of plants to have a good sale.

You are also asked to donate your time when the sale happens. It takes a lot of volunteers the night before the sale and the morning of the sale to have it run smoothly. New and continuing members benefit from getting to know each other better during the course of this work. It is very different from sitting at our monthly meetings. You will catch the enthusiasm of the other members and truly feel a part of the Club.

Last year's sale was terrific – we had an abundance of plants, our customers were more than satisfied, we had a great time and our Club did very well financially.

Here are some pointers:

1. **When should you pot up your plants?** We want to sell well-rooted plants to our trusting customers. If you haven't already potted up your divisions or cuttings, do so in early in spring. Seeds can be started now indoors and either grown in or transplanted into 4" pots.
2. **What kind of plants should you bring?** Bring any plants you would want to buy yourself. We are known for our large variety of perennials at excellent prices, but also sell vegetables, herbs, biennials, annuals, shrubs and even trees.
3. **Please use good soil.** Putting a coffee filter in the bottom of the pot before adding soil keeps the soil in and allows drainage.
4. **Please identify your plants** – common name or Latin name...either or both are fine. You may also include: flower colour, whether the plant likes sun or shade, moist or dry, and the mature height. These are the most commonly asked questions at the sale.
5. **Pots/plants need to be clean and tidy.** During the week before the sale, please wash off your pots, trim off any dead leaves and otherwise tidy up your donations, so volunteer time is spent more constructively.
6. **Sign up lists** for setting up the day before the sale and selling plants the day of the sale will be passed around at several meetings.
