## B.C. Council of Garden Clubs General Meeting October 13<sup>th</sup> 2012

### The speakers:

Nora von Gerichon: “Beneficial bugs and Fungi: Improving Root Health”

Nora promises healthier, bigger, more beautiful plants with the use of beneficial bugs and fungi.

*Steinernema carpocapsae* nematodes would have killed the pine beetles if only they had been applied with fire fighting planes. *Phasmarhabditis hermaphrodita* nematodes effectively kill slugs but are not commercially available here.

Sarracenia or pitcher plants are hardy and carnivorous (and have been keeping my ant population down for years).

Endo-ecto mycorrhizal root enhancers make roots multiply, for healthier, bigger plants. Achlorophyllous plants eg. some types of orchids rely entirely on mycorrhizal symbiosis.

Predatory mites and nematodes are quite perishable, but mycorrhizal fungi spores will keep for up to 10 years.

Dan Straker: “Walk on the Wild Side: Vancouver’s Urban Wildlife”

Dan works for Stanley Park Ecological Society to promote awareness of, and cohabitating with wildlife.

Wildlife moves to the city because their habitat has been destroyed, and/or there is abundant food, and there are fewer predators. Some tips: Never feed wild animals because it leads to increased aggression and improper diet which causes overpopulation and disease. Keep your yard tidy and garbage and compost secure, keep your cat in at night, keep dogs on a leash and in sight.

Coyotes are intelligent, omnivorous, and lead complex social lives. City coyotes have learned to be nocturnal and 80% of their diet is rodents. Coyotes have big ears, golden eyes and busy tails.

Beavers hate the sound of running water.

Raccoons have a short lifespan only two years.

The best recipes for skunk smell removal include 3% hydrogen peroxide, baking soda and dish soap.

..Squirrels (the big ones...black and grey) all came from a gift of 8 mating pairs released in Stanley Park by the mayor of New York in 1909.

..Each bat eats 500 mosquito-sized bugs per hunting hour.
