Seeds of Diversity (SoD) is a Canadian volunteer organization that conserves the biodiversity and traditional knowledge of food crops and garden plants

Begun in 1984 as the Heritage Seed program, the organization now known as SoD is an independent charitable corporation operated by a volunteer board of directors. There are 1400 members, 119 of these are “seed-savers”. They save and grow out the seeds to re-offer to their fellow members through an annual seed catalog. The purpose is to prevent seed varieties from becoming extinct. A useful seed saving guide is available to purchase on saving

seeds (<http://www.seeds.ca/en.php>) and maintaining the seed’s true lines, with adequate distance between same types to prevent cross-pollination. The 2010 catalog contained 2,723 varieties of seeds.

The group is also involved in various projects such as growing out specific types of tomatoes and garlic. At the annual Seedy Saturday event at Van Dusen gardens, a SoD representative is always present – have a chat, and support and join this worthwhile cause! The low price of an annual membership of \$30 will help support their efforts. See <http://www.seeds.ca/en.php> for further information.

Chasmanthium latifolium

Northern Sea Oats, Wild Oats, Spangle Grass

It is best grown in: sun or shade, any soil. I love it because of its beautiful panicles, its bamboo-like foliage, best for cut 'flowers' – it turns copper in the fall, provides food for the birds in the winter.

Phlox paniculata

Common garden phlox

It is best grown in: sun or light shade. I love the white phlox to brighten up my shade garden – it is beautiful in the evenings and smells wonderful!

Geraniaceae

Cranesbill geranium

It is best grown in sun or part sun. I love it because it has lots of variety in bloom type and colour and leaf type – blooming time is relatively long and varies depending on plant – it likes the North Shore growing conditions



Eriophyllum lanatum
Woolly Sunflower

It is best grown in well drained soil in full sun. I love it because of its bright yellow daisy-like flowers all summer long, especially if it's cut back lightly when it stops producing as many flowers. To add to its appeal the grey-green foliage remains beautiful long after the flowers have gone, and provides a beautiful contrast to the Euphorbia 'Blackbird' which it is planted in front of.
