So far everything has survived! ©

It was August, the weather could not have been better. We swam walked the beautiful forest trails and started acquainting home: the well, the septic system, and the zillion pumps that anything in the house and around the house and from there back learn! Our new home and garden were bright and sunny and



in the nearby ocean, ourselves with our new connect everything and into the house ... lots to cheerful.

But as it doesn't always stay August and the weather and seasons do change eventually

the sun started to disappear and I realized that I didn't actually like our garden all that much, or not at all the longer I looked at it! To someone else it would certainly seem perfect, it is kind of a low-maintenance, rocky alpine landscape with the perfect choice of native and hardy plants, shrubs and trees. It is mulched with gravel in an effort to contain the most amount of moisture, as water is in such short supply on the island. It screams Xeriscaping all over! Somebody went through a lot of thought and effort and money to put it all in place. But that's just it, SOMEBODY, not us!! It looks and feels like somebody else's garden, and not ours. But the more I observe the garden the more I understand that they did absolutely the right thing given the conditions we have around here: very poor soil (rocks and rocks and rocks), very little water, and lots of native plants that grow like weeds (Salal, Oregon grapes and brambles to name a few). Also, our property is facing south, but slightly uphill and surrounded with towering cedar and other coniferous trees. Hence, no sun on the ground in the fall and winter at all, and a lot of shade throughout the rest of the year. How am I going to grow my vegetables??? Where am I going to put up my green house(s)??? Where is my wildflower meadow going to go??? All those pre-move bubbles of dreams and expectations are slowly bursting one after the other after the other ...

So I am faced with two options: Despair and drive my poor husband crazy with all the complaining, tears and ranting – or go on the attack, devise a plan and see what can be done with what we have, as a good gardener would do. First: I joined the garden club and realized that about 90% of my fellow club members deal with the same poor conditions as I do. Only a few lucky farmers down at the south end have the good soil and full sun exposure. Second: good soil can be carted in and we have to work with raised beds for the vegetables. At least we have excellent drainage. Third: we are investing in a rain water harvesting system so that I do not ever have to feel guilty when I water my vegetables.

Fourth: I am taking advantage of the darker months to learn as about permaculture, garden design, choice and location of greenhouses. 

The Good of the Hive (article forwarded by Maria on holidays ②)

Devastated by the decline of bee populations worldwide, I made a personal commitment to hand paint 50,000 honey bees in murals around the world. That's how many bees are needed for a healthy, thriving hive and that's how many I

will paint. It could take me 20 years, but I'm going to do it! Matthew Willey artist, founded The Good of the Hive®, an organization hovering at the intersection of art and planetary health, through his art and his imagination, Matthew inspires curiosity and awareness about the importance of honey bees and other pollinators while celebrating the power in human connection. But the work is about much more than that.



Honey bees within the hive 'think' collectively. They are hard-wired to understand that their immune system is collective. Their health is based on the health of the hive, not the individual bee. After a personal experience with a honey bee in 2008, Matthew realized that human health is the same way, although we rarely act like it. The global hive he is painting is a metaphor for the connectedness necessary for a healthy planet. The bees are a symbol for of all living things- humans, trees, animals, pollinators, water, soil and everything in between.
