

will be coming to the Lynn Valley Garden Club Thursday, March 19th with a truckload of his "Unique" soil amendmenton, prior to our meeting. He will be in the parkin lot around 6.30 pm - cost is \$10 per bag – sold on first come first served basis, while supplies last.

#### **The Product**

UNIQUE is a micro-biologically active, organic soil amendment, which is produced under closely controlled conditions and marketed by DOWN TO EARTH Ltd.

The only ingredients used to produce UNIQUE are: pig manure and sawdust/shavings.

### Nutrients

UNIQUE is an organic fertilizer. Its N:P:K(Nitrogen, Phosphorus, Potassium) ratios are: 2:4:2. These values have to be multiplied by a factor 3 to make a fair comparison with chemical fertilizers. The value of an organic fertilizer like UNIQUE is far higher than a chemical fertilizer, since almost all of the fertilizer stays in the soil and will be taken up by the plant's root system. A large % of chemical fertilizers will drain from the soil to the ground water and can not be utilised by the plants. An added benefit of UNIQUE is the availability of many beneficial micro elements, like: Calcium, Iron, Sulfur, Phosphorus, Manganese and many others.

Application for vegetable gardens. Before seeding or planting one may mix the top soil (rotorvating) with a layer of about 1 inch of UNIQUE. After germination of the young plants top dressing, once /month should be done during the growing season. This practise will add sufficient nutrients to the soil to grow a variety of vegetables.

### **Spring Fertilizing**

Some gardeners fertilize every spring, others not quite so often. Newly planted borders are usually good for a couple of years if the soil was prepared well initially. Older gardens often are re-invigorated by a spring feeding, and if you use a mulch of wood chips or bark it is a wise idea to fertilize your perennials every spring. When mulch begins to rot the bacteria responsible will rob the soil of available nitrogen.

There are boxes of fancy perennial food readily available in garden centers, and these are fine if your garden is relatively small. For larger borders it's a much better deal to buy large bags of all-purpose vegetable garden fertilizer. Look for something with a high middle number (e.g. 5-10-5, 10-15-10) to promote strong stems and lots of flowers. Do NOT be tempted to use lawn fertilizer on your perennials — it is too high in the first number, nitrogen. Also, don't ever use a "weed and feed" formulation on any part of your garden other than lawn grass.

Whatever product you choose, follow the manufacturer's rate carefully. Sprinkle fertilizer AROUND your perennials, not directly on top of the clumps. This will help to avoid burning the foliage

## Tips & Handy Hints –

Begonias:

- a To get a good start on bulbs, put them in a pot of soil, lightly covered and place them on the top of the fridge.
- b. Start begonias in the little plastic containers that strawberries come in from the market. The containers allow the root system to grow freely, and makes lifting the bulbs, in the fall, easy without causing any damage.
- c. The best plant food for hanging begonias is good old fish fertilizer.
- d. To treat begonias for mildew, dust with cinnamon spice.

Cactus

Place Christmas cactus outdoors in the shade during the summer to induce Christmas blooming.

Amaryllis

Let the leaves on your amaryllis bulb freeze back before it is stored for the rest period or the amaryllis will not bloom the next time. By freezing the leaves it signals the bulb to rest

Deer - three easy suggestions

- To discourage deer from eating your garden, rub a bar of deodorant soap (Irish Spring, one suggestion) on the rocks and trees surrounding the garden. Deer hate this smell.
- To repel deer save your old tea bags and coffee grounds, Scatter them around your plants, etc. Deer hate it and it is good for the soil.
- To keep deer out of your clematis, pin the absorbent pads from roasts, etc. to the vines.
