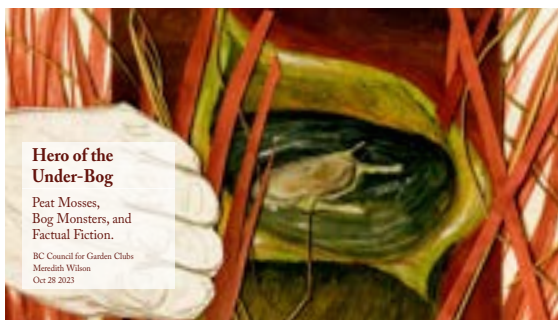
opened up three community gardens. There are some private ones but the City is working on adding more. Urban Bounty, formerly Richmond Food Security, is running their community garden programs on behalf of the City. They will offer workshops and manage the community garden spaces for the City.

We enjoyed Meredith Wilson, our Scholarship Fund recipient from UBC master's program. Her topic consisted of her master's thesis about peat mosses, bog monsters, and factual fiction. She is writing a book that's an allegory on a highly populated urban area in Vancouver where neighbourhoods sit on top of a giant bog (Mount Pleasant area)! Her book creates a story around this bog that cannot be remediated. It was a delightful presentation.

Richard Hebda, former curator of Botany and Earth History at the Royal BC Museum, is the current president of the BC Iris Society. Richard had an excellent presentation on the many different types of irises. 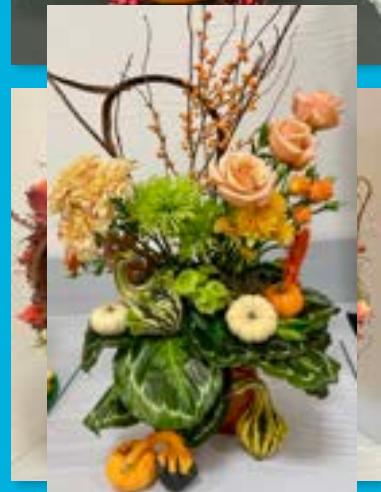
