Hello Everyone,

When you read this, our main event of the year, the plant sale, will be over; we won't yet know the outcome but with the meticulous organization and attention to detail that the MALS have demonstrated and with the help of all the wonderful volunteers, I am sure the sale will be a successful one.

Van Dusen Field Trip: There are still seats available on the bus – please sign up for this private tour of the gardens.

Gerry's Garden: Our club has been approached by Gerry's Garden asking club members to donate plants from their gardens to replace ones in Gerry's that were damaged during the cold of last winter. Gerry's Garden is a favourite of the Lynn Valley Garden Club and we have donated plants to them in the past. Specifically they are asking for *Rudbeckia*; Bee balm/*Monarda* - *Jacob Cline*; Amelia* and *Fothergilla*.

If you would like to donate plants, please email frankmorton@gmail.com to advise him of the plants you have. Once he has confirmed that he can use the plants, you can leave them in the garden 'behind the red bench located west of the circle bed which is in the middle of the garden'. You can then email him to let him know that you have dropped off the plants. Alternatively, he has offered to pick up plants from members' houses.

After our Loutet Farm Tour on June 20th (more info to come), Gerry's Garden has consented to us bringing our folding chairs and continuing our evening in the garden.

Donations Committee: We need to have two club members join with one former Donations Committee member to strike a new committee to choose the recipients of donations of 50% of plant sale proceeds and 100% of proceeds from the DIG for 2024. This would entail one or two meetings for selection which will then be voted on by members at the November AGM. If you can volunteer for this committee please contact Penny Le Couteur . Also, if you know of any potential recipients for, our donations let Penny know as soon as possible, so that we can be sure they meet our criteria and possibly get on the list.














Answer: a Bee

Becka Nathan, Education and Program Coordinator for the Edible Garden Project, will be our host. She will take us on a tour of the farm and the area behind the farm where Loutet Farm is working on restoration projects such as removing invasive species and planting and supporting native plants.

There is free paved parking near the entrance to the farm (lot shared by Loutet Farm, Loutet Park, and Gerry's Garden). Once inside the farm, paths are wood chips, and there are no steep inclines on the site. We may also use the dirt trails of the forest and/or the grass field during the field trip. There are no animals on site, but other environmental allergens may be present.

Washroom facilities are available while the park is open (generally from sunrise to sunset) and are wheelchair accessible. After the tour we will gather in Gerry's Garden for social interaction amid the flowers! Please bring your fold up chair and any refreshments.

The Plant Sale brings out the best of LVGC, both in the human and botanical departments (concurrently!). I had forgotten how much fun it is to see everyone, get a moment to chat, exchange gossip, knowledge, thoughts – the wonderful flotsam of social interactions that make life worth living. Hmmm – that reminds me of 'gossip' – I read recently that the word 'gossip' did not always mean 'women's idle talk' but came from the Old English *godsibb*, from *god* and *sibb*, the term for the godparents of one's child or the parents of one's godchild, generally very close friends. Only in the 16th century, did the word assume the meaning of a person, mostly a woman, one who delights in idle talk, a newsmonger, a tattler. This denigration of the word was also synchronous with women's labor status that eroded considerably – even collapsed entirely–during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries.

According to their self-representations, western European guilds in the early modern period (1500–1800) were archetypal patriarchal institutions and their statues prevented women from being anything except wives, daughters or widows and restricted women's economic participation. (See link) As inheritors of a mostly Western European culture, that economic gap, established so long ago – still exists, and we are still talking about it – but under a different rubric: "According to Statistics Canada (2022) as of 2021, the gender pay gap for full-time and part-time employees is 0.89, which means women make 89 cents of every dollar men make. The gender pay gap for full-time employees is 0.90, which means women make 90 cents of every dollar men make." (see link).


In this context and economic climate, it makes eminent sense to offset food insecurity (Thank you LVGC for bringing those Harvest Project contributions!) and to "teach a man to fish" – or in our case, advance the knowledge of growing one's own food, of living sustainably, of being stewards of nature and our ecology – of "rogue gardening".

Oh yes – you'd be surprised how many of our members do that!! Not only do they 'harrumph' and clean up the nearest swath of greenway; make butterfly gardens out of public walkways; plant rescued trees in the greenbelt; grow veggies on the boulevard; encroach on the neighbour's nasty garden and plant flowers for pollinators; go on digs and rescue plants, etc. etc. etc. LVGC has a secret, unsung ARMY of militant gardeners... They make the world a better place, one plant at a time. Or as my Granny used to say, "You can't save the world, but you can create beauty around you, and indeed, you must!"

All this came from 'idle gossip' at the Plant Sale... It started with my discussion with a happy Maggie as she hauled away her cedar sapling for planting *behind* her property, and Julie who owned up to gently encroaching on a neighbour, or Jackie who openly tends city property, and Judith who cleans up DNV messes... and I know about Aline's and Kitty's butterflyways... and probably there are many, many more.


I would love to get a census of LVGC's militant gardeners' works: please let me know about your almost-legit gardening projects! I am pretty sure we would all be VERY surprised.
