COMPOST BIN - Maria Issa

California is burning. On today's Global news, "Earth recorded its **hottest year** ever in 2024, with such a big jump that the planet temporarily passed a major **climate** threshold**, several weather monitoring agencies announced Friday." [For the whole report, please see the LINKS file.] Not only is it horrible for people and the environment, it is yet again the blame and finger-pointing: anything to deny climate change and blame a person or agency, for insufficient water. People lose all common sense – and have obviously never absorbed basic science. Let me lay it out for you.... (with the help of the Encyclopaedia Britannica – see link)

"combustion, a chemical reaction between substances, usually including oxygen [oxidation reaction] and usually accompanied by the generation of heat and light in the form of flame. The rate or speed at which the reactants combine is high, in part because of the nature of the chemical reaction itself and in part because more energy is generated than can escape into the surrounding medium, with the result that the **temperature of the reactants is raised to accelerate the reaction even more.**

A familiar example of a combustion reaction is a lighted match [or a dry California Eucalyptus tree]. When a match is struck, friction heats the head to a temperature at which the chemicals react and generate more heat than can escape into the air, and they burn with a flame. If a wind blows away the heat or the chemicals are moist and friction does not raise the temperature sufficiently, the match goes out. Properly ignited, the heat from the flame raises the temperature of a nearby layer of the matchstick [and dry trees and houses] and of oxygen in the air adjacent to it, and the wood and oxygen react in a combustion reaction."

So basically, combustion requires 3 things: and initiating event, fuel and oxygen. In the case of poor California, the environment and trees and brush have been super dry because there has been very little rain the last couple of years. If you look up California rainfall statistics – [see links] most of the state is well below "normal" and has been for a while. It's DRY. That makes ignition easy. Almost anything can set it off.... no, it doesn't matter whether it was a human or not - the CONDITIONS are set up by climate change. And that "climate threshold" (vide supra) for the world is sort of like the ignition temperature for the match. Ponder that for a bit.

Fuel is all around – the vegetation is dry. Those aforementioned eucalyptus trees, iconic of California, are particularly prone to fires. Yup, iconic they may be, but they are actually an invasive. "Tasmanian blue gum eucalyptus (*Eucalyptus globulus*), a symbol of California for some, never knew California soil until the 1850s, when seeds from Australia were planted, first as ornamentals, then mostly for timber and fuel." [.....] ""Blue gum eucalyptus is one of the most fire-intensive



plants. Trees not only put a lot of fuel on the ground as they shed bark, leaves and twigs, but in intense fires, volatile compounds in foliage cause explosive burning". Just another reason to support native plants. While California does have a *Eucalyptus* replacement strategy – it may be too little, too late.

You are all old enough to have used a bellows – or at least have blown on a fire to make it go. The more oxygen a fire gets, the better the oxidation reaction proceeds. Enter the katabatic Santa Ana winds that bring the lowest humidity to Southern California, and they blow and blow providing oxygen to the flames. Not only do they fan the flames, but spread the embers, propagating it.

In the face of such disaster – it is easy to feel helpless and give up.

NO WAY! There are many useful things one can do. As my grandmother, an artist, used to say, "You can't save the world, but you MUST create beauty around you." You are already doing that by growing gardens, protecting trees, guerilla gardening, planting native species, growing your own veggies, living sustainably, composting *etc*. If you feel you could do more, look up the **BC Climate Emergency Campaign** – (see Judith Brook's article, above) and look on their website [LINKS file] for "individual actions". There is a pile of petitions you can sign – it costs you nothing other than a few minutes of your time. However, know that a single response is worth 10!! Politicians know that only about 10% of people actually do anything like sign petitions; most people just whine but don't bother. SIGN! Of course you can financially support a number of these organizations as well... just sayin'.

It will give you suggestions on how to reduce your carbon footprint. It will also give you an opportunity to do a "carbon offset". You can also use ECOSIA as your browser, rather than Google. For two reasons – I don't believe in giving more money to billionaires – they don't need it – and because for every search you do, ECOSIA plants trees to restore deforested areas of the planet. For me, that's a win:win.

I must admit to certain level of guilt: my generation and the one before us, and our thoughtless habits are responsible for this. I'm not sure how I can 'explain' to my children and grandchildren that I participated in destroying their future. This is why I advocate where I can; do what I can, support what I can. For their sake, I can't give up.
